The Ancient Art of Basket-Making / Multicultural Arts & Crafts

Using a variety of materials, students will develop skills in one or more art forms, connecting the art with multicultural studies and indigenous cultures. Inclusion of legends or music during some projects will increase understanding and appreciation for other cultures. The use of plants as materials in some projects will stimulate a discussion of respect for nature. Discussion about the uses of the objects in the culture, as well as viewing traditional art items, will promote an awareness and appreciation of the importance of the art in that culture. Many options are available, including a variety of Basketry projects, Dreamcatchers, Huichol Yarn Art, Charm Bags, Latin American art forms, etc. Projects can be designed to fit the needs of each school program. A packet of information and resources will be provided for classroom teachers.

Residency Requirements

Different art forms have different room requirements and materials costs. It is helpful to have a separate room with warm water nearby for some projects, but many projects can be moved from room to room. Assistance of classroom teacher and other adult volunteers usually is necessary. Students may need an old towel in some classes. Some art materials may be provided by school, such as: copier, permanent and washable markers, masking tape, pipe cleaners, etc.
